Lower Windsor Township and FEMA

Mitigation Specialists

Lower Windsor Township has been working with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) mitigation specialists since 2014 in order to bring the Township into compliance related to development in Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA). The Township is required by federal law to reduce the risk to residents and properties, improve the health of the waterways of the Commonwealth, and bring the Township into compliance with FEMA's directives. Failure to do so jeopardizes flood insurance for all property owners in the Township.

All property owners whose land have some area within the SFHA were notified in December 2022, of the investigation currently going on. The Township must inspect all improvements in the SFHA going back to 1975 when the first Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) were issued by FEMA.

The Lower Windsor Floodplain Ordinance (first adopted in 1983 and twice revised) requires all properties located within the SFHA to obtain permits when improvements are made, regardless of whether the improvements meet the requirements of the Uniform Construction Code or the Township Zoning Ordinance for permit obligation. Improvements to existing structures within the floodplain without a permit are a violation of the Floodplain Ordinance.

Specific items to be reviewed on properties where buildings are used residentially are the following:

Is the first finished floor of the dwelling 18" above the Base Flood Elevation (known as the regulated flood elevation)?

Are all utilities/mechanical systems elevated 36" above the Base Flood Elevation?

Is there a basement in the dwelling? If yes, is it used only for vehicle parking, building access and incidental storage? If it is enclosed, are there vents to allow flood waters to equalize?

Additional items to be reviewed for accessory structures and recreational vehicles (RVs) within the SFHA are below.

Accessory structures cannot exceed 200 s.f., must be anchored to the ground and have floodwater vents.

There shall be no storage of buoyant, flammable, explosive, and/or hazardous materials, or they shall be stored above Regulatory Flood elevation (Base Flood Elevation + 18").

RVs, trailers, and vehicles parked or stored within the SFHA must be maintained, licensed, registered and roadworthy. RV's require a permit and must be removed after 180 days.

The Township is encouraging all property owners and leaseholders to not store any buoyant, floatable items within the SFHA. These may include firewood, lawn chairs, barbecue grills, propane tanks, picnic tables, kayaks and the like. There is not always a great deal of warning before the flood waters – or ice floes rise.

Lower Windsor is mandated by federal law to implement the Floodplain Ordinance. Residents who refuse may receive a citation, in accordance with Section 235-16 of the Lower Windsor Township Codified ordinances, which provides for fines and penalties, including a summary filing at the District Magistrate. How Does a Septic System work?

1. All water runs out of your house from one main drainage pipe into a septic tank.
2. The septic tank is a buried, water-tight container. Its job is to hold the wastewater long enough for solids to settle to the bottom (sludge) while the fats, oil and grease float to the top (scum).
3. For conventional septic systems liquid wastewater exits the tank and is spread evenly throughout the drain field, usually through a distribution box. Systems with more advanced treatment may have an additional component between the septic tank and drainfield.
4. Once in the drainfield, the wastewater percolates into the soil, which reclaims the water for future reuse by naturally removing some harmful bacteria, viruses, and some nutrients. This process may vary based on the site conditions of your property (e.g., soil type, proximity to water). A septic system service provider and your septic system's "as built" drawings will be able to tell you what type of system is on the property. The average lifespan of a septic system is 15-40 years, but it may last longer if properly maintained. Just like changing the oil in your car, maintaining your septic system extends its life for a small cost compared to the expense of installing a new system, which typically runs \$15,000 or more.

Think at the sink, and don't overload the commode. Consider what you put down your sink and toilet. Limit the use of your garbage disposal. Avoid using common household items that can clog your system or kill the microbes underground that you need to treat the wastewater.

"System cloggers" - diapers, baby wipes (even those marketed as flushable), cat litter, cigarettes, coffee grounds, fats, grease, solids, feminine hygiene products and prophylactic devices.

"Treatment Killers" - household chemicals, gasoline, oil, pesticides, antifreeze, paint and high amounts of anti-bacterial soaps and detergents.

Don't strain your drain. The less water you use, the less your septic system has to work. Stagger the use of water-based appliances, use high-efficiency plumbing fixtures, and repair any leaks.

Shield your field. Keep anything heavier than your lawnmower off your drainfield. Divert rain and surface water away from it. Plant trees and bushes away from the drainfield, since roots can clog your field and cause the system to fail. Your local garden center will be able to tell you the likely length of the tree and shrubs roots.

Protect it & inspect it regularly to avoid possible issues.

Zoning Department

Hiring a Contractor

Once you hire a contractor, but three weeks BEFORE work is scheduled to begin, the homeowner or the contractor MUST apply for a permit. Building permits can take up to fifteen business days, because they are reviewed by a third party, Commonwealth Code Inspection Services, Inc.

If the contractor applies for the permit, the homeowner should ask the contractor for the permit, so that it may be posted in the window of the residence. If the contractor does not get a permit, the homeowner is still legally responsible to obtain one.

Springtime Property Maintenance Tips for Homeowners!

Here are some of the most common “problems” that homeowners encounter as the weather gets warmer. By staying on top of these issues you can avoid letters from the Township (which could result in fines).

Remember to mow the grass! Once grass or weeds get higher than 12”, it is a violation.

Keep trash, junk and debris cleaned up on your property

Bushes and trees must be trimmed back along the roadway – especially at intersections where sight distance is a safety issue.

Swimming Pools

Any pool with the ability to hold water deeper than 24 inches requires a permit and inspection from Lower Windsor Township. This includes ‘big box store’ pool kits.

Consider the following building permit guidelines BEFORE you make a pool purchase.

- Swimming pools must be completely enclosed by a four foot high fence or wall with a self-closing locking gate. This does not apply to above ground pools having a minimum solid wall height of four feet and having a retractable ladder, or those having less than twenty-four inches of water. The fence or wall must be erected and inspected before the pool is filled with water.
- All pools shall be set back five feet from side and rear property lines measured either from the wall of the pool or any associated decking or concrete aprons.
- No water from a pool shall be discharged onto any public street or alley nor onto adjoining property.
- Pools MAY NOT use extension cords to connect the pump. A single twist-lock receptacle may be located between five and ten feet from the pool. A 120 volt convenience outlet shall be located within ten feet and twenty feet of the pool. All receptacles serving the pool and all outdoor receptacles shall be GFCI protected.

These regulations apply to all pools with water that is or can be twenty-four inches or deeper.

Trees and Shrubs

Bushes and trees along the roadway and sidewalks are required to be trimmed up fourteen feet high from the pavement or concrete. This allows traffic to use the full width of the street and keeps pedestrians on the sidewalk. Also, if your shrubs or plantings are near your neighbor’s driveway, please trim them back to avoid unsafe conditions.

Township policy is to send a friendly request to trim the trees or shrubs away from the street or sidewalk. After a few weeks without action, you may get a notice of violation and even a fine. The trees and/or shrubs will be trimmed by the Public Works Department (which may not be the prettiest result).

District # 2 consists of all properties south of East Prospect Road and Calvary Church Road, and east of Prayer Mission Road and Snyder Corner Road. **Non-compliance WILL result in penalties!**

2023 Road Projects

The Road Master and Township Engineer have prepared their *proposed* list of road projects for 2023. As time and funds permit, the following work is anticipated in Lower Windsor Township.

Crack Sealing: All locations

Base Repair: All locations; including specifically, Prayer Mission Road, Trinity Road & Klines Run Road.

Bituminous Paving: Calvary Church Road, Meisenhelder Road & parking lots.

The highway department employees will be trimming back any vegetation that hinders the clear sight distance at intersections, as well as any vegetation within the public right-of-way. This also includes intersections where Township roadways intersect with state roads.

Brush Drop-off

The Township's highway department offers brush drop-off for Lower Windsor Township residents. Proof of residency is required.

Brush drop-off is scheduled for the second Saturday of each month through October. Since the second Saturday of April is Easter weekend, the first brush drop-off of this year will be April 15, 2023. It is held from 7:00 am to 9:00 am at the highway building located at 111 Walnut Valley Court. Signs will designate the drop-off area and employees will be available to assist. **ITEMS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AT ANY OTHER TIME.**

Can Emergency Services see your Building Number?

In 2008 the BoS passed an Ordinance requiring all buildings to have an address to post and maintain the street number on the building. These numbers must be no less than 4" high and of contrasting color and located so they are visible from the road. Reflective is best.

On buildings more than 100 ft from the road or where landscaping conceals them, the numbers must be posted at the end of the driveway nearest the road. Where more than one building is located along a private road or access drive, each address must be posted at the entrance of the street **and** at each individual drive or front yard.
