

ReworldTM and Goodwill Keystone Area have joined forces to provide free electronic waste recycling locations: 965 Loucks Road & 1120 Roosevelt Ave., both in York, along with 450 Eisenhower Dr., in Hanover & 535 S. Main St. Market Square Center, in Shrewsbury.

Fences & Signs

You are not required to have a permit to put a FENCE on your property, unless you want it to be higher than 6 feet. Fences higher than 6 feet require a BUILDING permit (their construction is regulated by the state). The fence can be located UP TO the property line, but you MUST know where the property line is before installing. No fence is permitted in the street right-of-way or blocking the sight line of traffic.

Commercial SIGNS in the Township require a building permit (their construction is regulated by the state). Personal, individual, and temporary yard signs do not require a permit. Neither sign is permitted in the street right-of-way or blocking the sight line of traffic.

Tips for Closing your SWIMMING POOL

In an effort to help protect our local waterways and their aquatic life, PA DEP recommends the following when closing your pool for the season.

Discharged pool water and waters containing chlorine or other chemicals can be detrimental to aquatic life if not handled responsibly. It is extremely important that these waters are handled correctly. Pool waters must not be discharged to any storm or sanitary sewer or land in which a storm sewer or stream is accessible. Runoff can cause fish kills and unsafe aquatic conditions.

- Never dispose of pool water through a storm sewer, which will discharge to a stream.
- If lowering the water level of the pool, STOP CHEMICAL ADDITIVES for ONE WEEK prior and let it drain to a vegetated area to prevent it from running off into a storm sewer or stream. Dissipate the water through a sprinkler or soaker hose to prevent channelization and infiltrate it on **your property**.
- Water may be used for irrigation if it does not run off the property or into a storm sewer, stream, or public roadway.
- If you cannot drain the pool in these ways have the water professionally pumped out.

The discharge of swimming pool water to any waters of the commonwealth without a permit is a **violation of the Clean Streams Law.** Property owners and pool companies that violate this law may be prosecuted and penalized for damages.

Mailbox Reminder to Homeowners

Lower Windsor Township reminds homeowners to prepare mailboxes for winter. Snow that is thrown from plows can damage mailboxes if they are not properly prepared and secured. A properly secured and located mailbox should be able to withstand the force of snow thrown from a plow, even in the worst conditions. Mailboxes should be placed as far from the edge of the road as possible yet still in reach of a mail carrier from a vehicle. Mailboxes are normally placed within the Township's legal right-of-way however, mailbox damage due to snow and not hit directly by the plow or truck is the homeowner's responsibility. Here are a few tips to help reduce mailbox damage:

- Place reflective tape on the mailbox to help operators see them at night. When removing snow from around the mailbox, throw snow behind it and not to the sides.
- Make sure the post is in good condition and the box is fastened securely to the post
- If damage occurred in the past, reconsider the positioning of structure before winter.

For those who follow these tips and still find themselves with a damaged mailbox, they may want to consider a cantilever mailbox support that can swing a mailbox out of harms way. Plans for such a mailbox are available on PennDOT's website, www.penndot.gov/winter.



2024 Snow removal policy

With winter soon approaching, the Highway and Police Departments ask that all residents keep these Township tips in mind during inclement weather.

- Avoid parking along Township roads when snow storms are anticipated.
 If a road is designated a Snow Emergency Route, vehicles must be removed from the roadway when there is three or more inches of snow expected.
- When a snow emergency is declared, Lower Windsor Township utilizes the major local television stations and Savvy Citizen for resident notification.
- As we receive up-to-date information from the National Weather Service, PennDOT, and York County Emergency Management, we will post it to our Savvy Citizen app.
- When clearing your driveway, shovel the snow on the lower side of the driveway so that the plow doesn't push it back into the area you have already shoveled.

Friendly Reminder

Parks & Recreation Ordinance § 300-16 states that when walking your pets in or around a recreational area, such as Rexroth Park, all pets are required to be on a leash at all times. Owners shall remove any and all fecal matter deposited by said pet while within the Township recreational facility.

Did you know?

The Lower Windsor Township Police Department has a drop box for unused/no longer needed prescription and OTC medications. The drop box is available Monday - Friday from 8am-4:30 p.m. and is no cost to our residents. If you have questions, please call 717-244-0855.

Zoning Department

Hiring a Contractor

Once you hire a contractor, but three weeks BEFORE work is scheduled to begin, the homeowner or the contractor MUST apply for a permit. Building permits can take up to fifteen business days, because they are reviewed by a third party, Commonwealth Code Inspection Services, Inc.

If the contractor applies for the permit, the homeowner should ask the contractor for the permit, so that it may be posted in the window of the residence. If the contractor does not get a permit, the homeowner is still legally responsible to obtain one.

Permits

Lower Windsor Township requires permits for many types of construction and building work. Some jobs require only a 'Zoning Permit' and other jobs will require a 'Building Permit'. These are separate permits which now use the same application form.

Zoning permits fall under Township rules and ordinances. Building Permits are governed by the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code and will require inspections during the work. Zoning Permits are issued within 10 business days and Building Permits require 15 business days.

There is only one permit application to fill out. The permit issued will be Zoning, Building or both. Each permit has different fee requirements, but both are issued from the Township office. For questions about permits, call the Township Zoning Officer, Monica Love, at 717-244-6813.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS:

In January of 2024 residents in District 3 were notified this is the year to have their septic tank pumped and inspected in accordance with Ordinance 2001-01. District 3 are all properties west of Prayer Mission and Snyder Corner Roads and South of East Prospect Road. If you received a notice and have not yet had your system pumped/inspected, please do so by the end of 2024. If you did not receive a notice, but think you should have, please contact the Township to verify your address. This is a PA State Mandate, and noncompliance will result in penalties. If you have a holding tank, you must have it pumped every year. Don't wait – pumper/haulers get very busy at the end of the year!

2025 will see residents in District 4 get notifications to have their septic tank pumped and inspected. District 4 are all properties north of East Prospect Road and west of Cabin Creek and Cool Creek Roads. You can also get your system pumped in 2024 – you'll still be compliant! Look for your letter in January.

October is Energy Awareness Month

October is Energy Awareness Month, a nationwide effort to highlight the importance of conserving energy and making sustainable choices. If you are looking for some simple ways for you or your business to save energy and money, check out these tips from PP&L.

- 1. Request a no-cost energy assessment.
- 2. Turn off equipment and lights when not in use.
- Use shades & blinds to control direct sun through windows in both summer and winter to prevent or encourage heat gain.
- 4. Set back thermostats during off hours. You can save as much as 10% a year on heating/cooling by simply turning your thermostat back 7-10 degrees for 8 hours a day from its normal setting.
- 5. Install LED bulbs and fixtures. Good-quality white LED products are expected to have a useful life of 30,000-50,000 hours or longer, while a typical incandescent lamp lasts about 1,000 hours.
- Perform annual maintenance on HVAC, compressed air, refrigeration and process equipment to keep systems functioning properly.

Eastern York Recreation Authority

The spring and summer heat did not stop 500 youth from playing baseball, soccer and softball. Thanks to over 150 volunteers, we had 19 baseball teams, 18 soccer teams and 11 softball teams in action, and the Hellam Horseshoe League also had a full slate of teams. After a brief summer pause, the adult basketball leagues are back on the court. From ages 16-76, we had 71 participants for our initial Line Dance Workshop and 16 registered for our first youth field hockey clinics. Local activities also included Tennis for Kids, Performing Arts Camp, and National Night Out.

As our registrations climb, the need for more facilities increases, but so have the opportunities. Contributions and grants from Wrightsville Borough Municipal Authority (WBMA) and York County Community Foundation's Bob Hoffman Sports and Fitness Fund have allowed us to start revitalizing three (of four) ball fields at Blessing Fields in Wrightsville Borough. WMBA donated a storage shed that was placed on site by Patriot Towing.

We are grateful for recent financial support, equipment, and in-kind donations from AEDGrant.com; DICK'S Sporting Goods; Frey Lutz; Hawk Gunning Club; Lucas Tools; Modern Landfill; PA Department of Health; Stauffer's Simply Animals, several anonymous donors, and our contributing municipalities – Hallam Borough, Hellam and Lower Windsor Townships. Also, a shout out to Sue's Market for preparing a variety of 2,100 sandwiches for our softball fundraiser. Youth softball installed a temporary batting cage at Rexroth Park.

Stay Safe this Winter

- Do NOT use stoves, ovens or grills to heat your home.
- Do NOT overload your electric outlets.
- Check/install carbon monoxide detectors.
- Check on elderly or vulnerable neighbors, friends, relatives and pets.
- Place space heaters on solid, level, and non-flammable surfaces away from bedding, drapes, and furniture.
- Clear snow and ice from your meter with a broom, not a shovel, and clear intake and exhaust/make-up air vents.

Septic Pumping

Please be aware, when having your septic system pumped and inspected, you are required to hire a pumper/hauler that is registered with the Township. They have agreed to abide by our regulations. Using an unlicensed pumper/hauler may have your manifest returned as unacceptable.

New Ordinance passed

On June 13, 2024 the Lower Windsor Township BOS passed Ordinance No. 2024-01. The following fees will apply with regard to your tax payments.

- A \$25 fee per written certification
- A \$20 fee for each returned check
- A service fee of \$5 per duplicate tax bill and \$5 service fee for duplicate tax receipt
- This was effective June 18, 2024

A note about your taxes

If your taxes are escrowed, it is your responsibility to contact your mortgage company to see if they need a copy of your bill. All original tax bills are sent to the homeowner.

If you need a receipt, include the entire copy of your bill (taxpayer copy and tax collector copy) with a self-addressed, stamped envelope. I will stamp and sign the taxpayer copy and return it to you for you to use as a receipt. If you do not include both copies of your bill with your self-addressed, stamped envelope, no receipt will be returned to you. This needs to be done for both the county & township bill and the school bill.

I do not accept any personal checks after December 9th. Money orders and cashier's checks can still be mailed or put in the drop box beside the office door up until December 31st. I also accept credit card payments until December 31st. The website is allpaid.com. (please note: there is a non-refundable 2.95% fee that goes to the credit card company.) Cash can be brought to the office during office hours until December 31st. I do not recommend sending cash in the mail or putting it in the drop box.

Please put your phone number on all payments. If there is a problem this is the quickest and easiest way for me to get in touch with you!!!

Everyone in the township over the age of 18 and under the age of 65 are legally required to pay a school per capita tax (some exceptions apply). If you have anyone in your household that is not receiving one, please contact me at my office.
